

# **CONSTABLE'S COMMENT**

#### **RESPONSIBILITY WITHOUT POWER**

Nine out of ten of the things parishioners ask me to fix are not within my power to do so: that's one of the reasons why I am supporting the idea of creating a Town Council for St Helier. Of course, I can and do pass on umpteen requests for improvements and change to the Government departments or Ministers who have the power to sort out a problem, and, as a backbencher in the States Assembly, I can and do ask questions or bring propositions and amendments forward for debate when the Government (as often happens) fails to take such requests seriously or to deal with them in a timely fashion. But it's a frustrating business being asked questions like, 'When is New

Street going to be resurfaced? It looks terrible!' or 'Have you seen the state of Liberation Square, Constable? It's a disgrace!' or 'Why isn't the Lido at Havre des Pas being properly maintained?'

I don't mind being held responsible for the state of our town if the Parish is given the power to improve it, fixing the things that are broken in an efficient and timely manner, with individual councillors given responsibility for important areas such as the cleanliness of our streets, the condition of our pavements and roads, the quality of our parks and open spaces, recycling and other portfolios such as licensing and even small-scale planning applications which, if managed well, can make such a positive difference to the quality of life of residents and to the success of the businesses operating in the Parish.

We now have had the useful experience of operating a Shadow Town Council, which has explored some of the areas of responsibility and which I believe could be devolved to the Parish by the Government of Jersey. The next step is for me to bring forward proposals to a Parish Assembly in the New Year, and if they are supported by parishioners, to take them forward to the States Assembly for debate.

# CARBON NEUTRALITY AND THE PARISH OF ST HELIER

COP26 has been in the news over recent weeks, with world leaders making various announcements and commitments to move towards carbon neutrality. In 2019, our Parish Assembly responded to a proposition from Deputy Ward, declaring a climate emergency, and committed the Parish to a move to carbon neutrality by 2025-30 - far ahead of COP26 dates.

Following this, a working group of interested parishioners and Parish officials was established and met to consider what this meant and how it might be achieved. A number of other parishes subsequently followed this model to develop their own plans.

The working group presented its report back to Parish Assembly later in 2019 - the key conclusion of the report being that the Parish's carbon footprint was largely driven by its use of fossil fuels for heating and cooking, and its vehicle fleet. Importantly, the report concluded that the Parish's carbon footprint would be reduced by 90% if it converted its heating, cooking and vehicle fleet to electric power.

The Parish Assembly adopted the report, and work has been ongoing ever since to plan and implement this transition to electric. A detailed plan is in place to convert all our buildings to electric heating over the coming years; indeed, work has already commenced with the removal of the oil heating system from our Seale Street offices. Gas cooking facilities at St Ewold's Residential Home have already been replaced with electric, and the Town Hall's gas-based kitchen will follow suit in 2022. In 2021, the Parish has purchased and deployed the first electric vehicles in our fleet and installed dedicated electric charging facilities at our Depot in Queen's Road. Although it is not yet viable to operate an all-electric fleet, we hope that over the

coming years suitable electric options for all our vehicles will become available and, as we replace our fleet, we will see an ever-decreasing number of petrol and diesel Parish vehicles on our roads.

Moving to electricity is vital to our carbon reduction programme, but so is being as efficient as possible in the use of that electricity. We have already implemented new low energy lighting throughout our Nelson Street offices, and are working with the JEC to investigate opportunities to reduce the energy use of our street lighting. We are also well on the way to installing the first on-street electric vehicle charging point in a Residents' Parking Zone, with consultation on proposals for other sites dues to take place later this year.

As well as commencing work to reduce our direct carbon emissions, we have started to look at how we might contribute to renewable electricity, working with the JEC to consider the viability of installing solar farms on the roofs of some Parish buildings.

We also continue to support and promote opportunities to improve our environment and help offset carbon emissions. In 2020, we commenced the GROW Project with Thrive Jersey to create a community orchard and smallholding in the north of the Parish; this successful project has recently received national recognition by the Royal Horticultural Society, being one of a small number of UK projects recognised as "outstanding for their work creating nature-based solutions to environmental challenges".

There is much more to come in 2022 and beyond to achieve our target of carbon neutrality, but this is a fantastic start.

# **SECOND YEAR OF** ST HELIER HISTORIC **TOWN WALKS COMPLETED**

St Helier's town walks, in conjunction with the Jersey Tourist Guide Association, have now ended for the year. A total of 18 walks took place led by 14 different guides, and over 330 people, locals and visitors alike, turned up – some St Helier ratepayers have been on virtually all of the walks! They cover a wide range of topics, including general history, WW1, the Occupation, arts and culture, geology, and also some of the more gruesome events that have taken place in our capital over the last few centuries. Our most popular walk has been the Revolution, Riots and a bit of Rebellion one, led by Sue Gorin.

We look forward to a third series of historic walks starting in the New Year.

#### YOU ARE ENTITLED TO REGISTER TO VOTE IF YOU ARE ORDINARILY **RESIDENT IN JERSEY AND:**

- · You are at least 16 years old and
- You have lived in the Island for either
- o The last 2 years or
- o The last 6 months plus additional period(s) that total at least 5 years

You can apply to register up to 3 months before your 16th birthday or up to 3 months before completing either of the residence periods mentioned above.

Finally, and in conjunction with Government's guidelines, we recommend that everyone continues to wear face coverings in crowded or indoor areas. The Team appreciates everyone's cooperation and understanding of the sanitising measures that remain in place throughout the Town Hall as we all look forward to a pandemic-free future.

# ROYAL HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY RECOGNITION FOR GROW JERSEY, ST HELIER, BY SHEENA BROCKIE

The RHS Community Awards were released in October, with some awesome news regarding our Project! In place of the Britain in Bloom finals tour, this year the expert panel considered 118 digitally-submitted projects across 5 categories that recognise distinct aspects of community gardening. Each entry demonstrated a clear dedication to supporting, transforming and connecting communities through the power of horticulture.

20 of those projects have been recognised for their work, and I'm delighted that GROW is on that list under

the category 'Green Solutions' – creating nature-based solutions to environmental challenges.

# JÈRRIAIS, GERAINT JENNINGS: SPRINGFIELD

With recent concern over the prolonged closure of the Opera House, and consultation over new performance spaces, let's look back to a time when Springfield was a major entertainment venue.

On February 28th 1927 Springfield Entertainments Ltd was established by some members of the RJA&HS so as to apply for a liquor licence at Springfield, which was initially leased to the new company for £200 per year. The leaky hall required repairs but soon Springfield was booming as

The Battle of Flowers was held at Springfield from 1928 until the outbreak of WWII (admission 1s 2d), and the hall was used for drama from the Malvern Players, the Jersey Green Room Club, Les Enfuntchis and others. There was ballroom dancing, Jersey Eisteddfod, variety shows, as well as cattle shows, fruit and veg shows, children's parties, religious rallies and all sorts of meetings and events.

Springfield was taken over as a first-aid post and air-raid shelter at the outbreak of WWII and used by

the occupying authorities as a compound for confiscated vehicles.

After the Liberation with new 21-year leases signed, entertainment and culture returned with Ballet Rambert, Ballet Nègre, also trade shows, Ideal Home exhibitions, rollerskating, whippet-racing and even German beer festivals.

However, by the early 1960s demand was dropping, and even concerts from The Beatles and The Rolling Stones did not keep Springfield from facing the challenge of remaining at the top. Plans were considered to turn the hall into a swimming pool, to build bowling alleys, tennis courts, squash courts, a go-kart track...

In the 1970s the development of Fort Regent as an entertainment venue placed pressure on Springfield Entertainments but they still estimated that over 120,000 people visited Springfield annually.

Many of those people still with us will have memories of what was once described as "the sporting, theatrical, social and amusement centre of the Island".

Achteu nou peut payi tout sîmpliément atout eune tape dé carte et auve la dreine haûchithie d'la lînmite jusqu'à chent louis, ch'est eune tapée d'sou qu'nou peut transféther d'même.

Don pouor remplyi les pouques à doleuses et en aver des poutchies d'acats, ch'est d'viédgi les boutiques dé lus vainnées et ouadginnées dé marchandises (tch'ont 'té d'livrées en bat'lées à la caûchie). Et en envyant ses sou à la gliaine, v'là tch'aîgu'tha l'êcononmie, mais tchiquefais i' vaut prendre chein qu'i' dithent les êcononmistes auve eune pînchie d'sé!

Probably farmers, merchants and fishermen have been careful to cut their cloth in order to amass wealth. Now contactless payments have been raised to £100, it's a large amount of money one can pay by card. So with bagfuls of shopping, it's time to empty the shops of the vanfuls and lorryfuls of goods (delivered by the boatful at the harbour). Spending one's money by the handful will help the economy, but sometimes take what economists say with a pinch of salt!


