WELCOME

Welcome to the September edition of the Town Crier, which is appearing as the Parish and the Island are in mourning over the death of our late Sovereign, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. The Town Hall has been open since the day after the passing of her Majesty and a Book of Condolence made available for parishioners to sign. It has been very poignant for the staff in the Town Hall to witness the steady stream of people, including many visitors to the Island. Last Sunday the Proclamation of King Charles III took place in the Royal Square, and today the Island has the opportunity to remember the Queen at a special service in the Town Church. The special Bank Holiday agreed by the States Assembly last week for Monday 19th September will allow parishioners to watch the State Funeral in London and to reflect on what her late Majesty has meant for us as individuals and families during the 70 years of her reign.

CONSTABLE'S COMMENT

REST IN PEACE, YOUR MAJESTY

Her Majesty the Queen was the epitome of commitment to public service, who inspired generations of Jersey people to dedicate at least some of their lives to serving their fellow Islanders. The tradition of honorary service in the parishes is at the heart of what so many individuals do when they take their oaths in the Royal Court to serve in the Honorary Police and to fulfil other parochial roles, and I am sure that the Island's Honorary Police, in particular, will have found the passing of Her Majesty especially poignant as they have committed so many hours to the arrangements for Royal visits, not only the visits to Jersey undertaken by Her late Majesty and the Duke of Edinburgh but also the other Royal visits that we have been privileged to receive. The fact that Her Majesty was fulfilling her own personal oath to serve her people right up until the last days of her life is a further example, if any were needed, of her extraordinarily selfless and generous character.

Her Majesty last visited the Island for the 60th Anniversary of our Liberation on 9th May 2005, and I was honoured to be invited to introduce her to some of my parishioners as well as the Burgermeister of Bad Wurzach and his wife who were visiting Jersey at that time following the signing of the twinning agreement with St Helier in 2002. Friendship and reconciliation between our communities was a particular theme on that Liberation Day with a moving performance by the Jersey Youtheatre, and I am sure that this added to Her Majesty's appreciation of what was to be her final Liberation Day in Jersey.

Every Islander who has suffered bereavement, especially when their loved one has been of an advanced age, will have realised how inadequate is the frequently made comment that the deceased lived to a 'ripe old age' or had a 'good innings'. For the older one's lost relative is, whether it be mother, father, or grandparent, the deeper one's roots will have grown into the relationship. Therefore, as well as wishing to express my gratitude for her 70 years of absolutely exemplary service, I wanted to express my sense of loss at the passing of the Queen, which I am sure is shared by all of my parishioners.

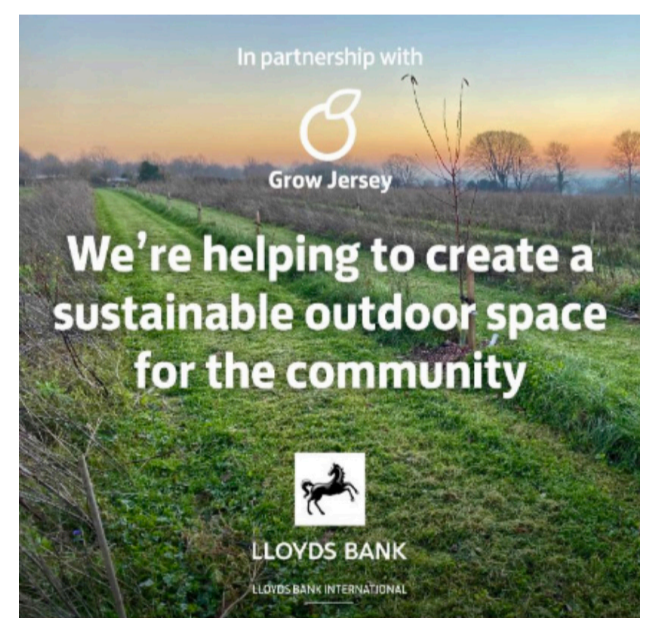
PROJECT ACCELERATES DEVELOPMENT PLANS FOLLOWING £40,000 SPONSORSHIP FROM LLOYDS BANK INTERNATIONAL, BY SHEENA BROCKIE

This £40,000 funding from Lloyds Bank will enable the Project to acquire an electric vehicle, giving access to those who would find it difficult to manoeuvre around the field easily and the ability to transport large quantities of compost or mulch around the large site. The funding will also support a dedicated focus on developing this community project further, ensuring opportunity for the initiative to expand its reach in the next 12 months.

We are delighted that the team at Lloyds Bank believes wholeheartedly in the GROW vision. The Project has sustainability at its core, growing food for the community using regenerative land management practices, improving soil and wildlife biodiversity whilst providing that all-important nature connection - a green lifeline to many people combatting loneliness and isolation, especially post-Covid.

At the beginning of September GROW held a volunteers open afternoon - a celebration of all the wonderful volunteers who have joined us over the last year and an invitation to potential volunteers to come and meet the team. We started with a few tasks: watering the veg bed and cutting down the docks, and then enjoyed homemade soup (with onions, tomatoes and courgettes from the field) and lashings of cake and jam made with nature's bounty.

OVERSEAS DEBUT AT THE GREAT BRITAIN AIR RIFLE JUNIOR INTERNATIONAL 2022

Parishioner Paige Fryer, a 17-year-old female rifle athlete, made her overseas debut at the above event last month, which saw 125 athletes competing from across the UK and South Africa at the NSRA's Bisley headquarters. Paige has been training with the Jersey Air Rifle Club since first trying the sport with the Scouts in 2018 and, more recently, with the St Brelade's Smallbore Rifle Club.

Both air rifle and prone events score shots to one decimal point, enabling graduation from a perfect inside of the middle bullseye to just touching it and downwards towards the white outer rings. For 50m Rifle the bullseye is a little over a centimetre in diameter and for 10m Air Rifle its just 0.5mm across, about the same as a printed full stop.

The event covered various areas, including the outdoor 50m Prone Rifle PET, which saw Paige taking Bronze with 599.4 - just 4.5 points behind top score,

and the 60 shot 10m Air Rifle qualification round, in which Paige came 4th with a score of 592.5. The final required the top 8 competitors from the qualification round to shoot several series of 5 shots within a time limit, introducing eliminations of the lowest performances; Paige coped well and finished a respected 5th. Then followed the outdoor 50m range for the Prone qualification match, seeing Paige finish 5th. The last shoot of the day, the 10m Air Rifle GP, took place with uncomfortable indoor temperatures under a baked metal roof, but Paige performed well throughout.

The final results were tight, with the winner from Wales gaining just 2.4 more points than Paige who came 6th, separated by English and Scottish athletes. Overall, an amazing debut for Paige, and a scene set for her next senior competition - the European Division Commonwealth Championships in Cardiff. Good luck Paige!

GERAINT JENNINGS: URBAN TREE-PLANTING IN 1810

Over the past couple of hundred years, The Parade has changed from dunes outside the Town gates, to a military parade ground, to a disreputable wasteground, to a French-style esplanade, to English-style gardens, to an urban space dotted with monuments, used for recreation and entertainment and activities.

Back in 1810 efforts started to make what was then described as La Grande Parade more attractive. In October 1810 a notice appeared in La Gazette de Césarée requesting "that no person will walk on the Grande Parade, until the Grass has sufficiently taken root." Another notice explained that it was proposed to make a large, wide promenade for the use of the public around the Grande Parade, and that such a national amenity was desirable to so populous a Town as Saint Helier, as much for recreation as for the

health of the inhabitants. An appeal was made for donations of saplings to plant for the project, and those who had young trees to spare were invited to deliver them between October and December 1810 to Captain Lauzunproche at the Town Mills. A preference was stated for lime-trees, elms and poplars, however all donations of any trees would be gratefully received.

The poor saplings did not all last. A notice in April 1811 offered 10 guineas reward for information leading to the conviction before the Royal Court of the offender or offenders who had cut down or otherwise destroyed several of the young trees upon the Grande Parade.

As we look towards further greening of our streets, safeguarding and extending our parks, we can also look back two centuries to how the same issues occupied our predecessors.

HEALTH IS GOLDEN

The new hospital is still in the news and the question of the cost. In the old days, folk were wary of doctors and preferred traditional remedies. This wasn't surprising when doctors were in favour of bloodletting as a cure-all. People said it's better to pay the baker than the doctor (equivalent of an apple a day keeps the doctor away) and that getting the doctor in was just patching up an old bachîn. Now it is hoped that our doctors are as wise as Salomon Journeaux (believed to be Jersey's first native-born trained doctor in the 16th century). But a doctor was rarely paid, and it is said that Jersey's only doctor was so poor that people knitted stockings out of pure charity.

Today's health system looks after us all, and if you have Autumnal ague, aches and pains, sniffles, or a stinking cold, get well soon!

Children in our Sunshine Room have been growing new potatoes and green beans in the garden and, when they were ready to harvest, they peeled and chopped them and made a delicious soup that everyone enjoyed at snack time.

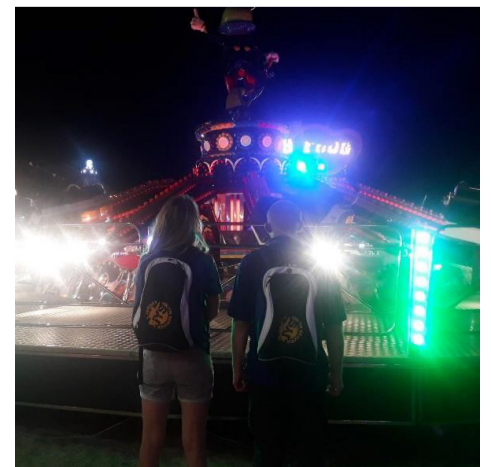
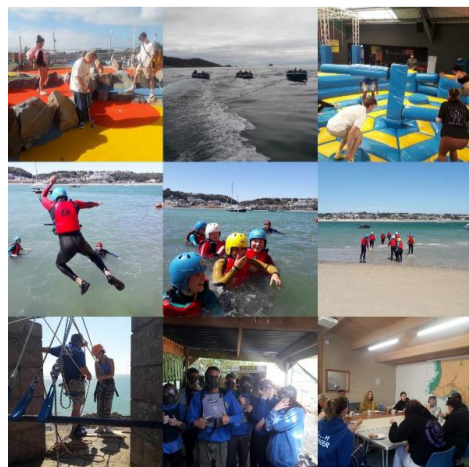
BUSY SUMMER HOLIDAY PERIOD FOR THE MOVE ON YOUTH PROJECT (from Youth Worker Anna Peters)

During the summer holidays we continued to hold 2 club sessions per week, as well as some free activities courtesy of funding received from the Condor Community Fund. Our young people enjoyed crazy golf, inflatables rides, trampolining,

airsoft sessions and a 2-night residential at St Aubin's Fort, all of which provided opportunities to them to keep busy and engaged, and our young people said that they would not normally do these things and that it was nice to be treated otherwise they'd not have been able to do them at all.

The Youth Project also ran our weekly street-based sessions around St Helier, and, in addition, the Funtastia travelling theme park returned to People's Park for the first time since the pandemic. It was lovely to see the young people enjoying themselves and the rides, and it was really beneficial having young workers present at the fair, meaning that young people had another known professional to talk to and an opportunity for support if required - 314 engagements and interactions were undertaken.

The meeting of the St Helier Roads Committee scheduled for Wednesday 21st September has been cancelled in order to allow the Autumn Branchage to take place after it was postponed.

VISITE DU BRANCHAGE ET DES CHEMINS

In accordance with the requirements of the Loi (1914) sur la Voirie, as amended, the second Visite du Branchage of the year will take place in St Helier on Friday 9th September. The Loi requires occupiers of land bordering on the public roads of the Parish to trim hedges and branches and to cut all overhanging trees so as to give a clearance of 12 feet over main roads and byroads and of 8 feet over footpaths and to remove any

other encroachments on the public highway. A fine may be levied for each infraction. The attention of occupiers of land is drawn to the need to ensure that all cuttings and trimmings are removed from the roads and footpaths after the Branchage is completed.
