Recently we have seen another example of yet more challenging circumstances affecting residents of St Helier: this time the flooding of Grands Vaux, and our hearts go out to all of those impacted by the loss of valued possessions and the additional stress caused to families and individuals in the area. Once again, however, Jersey's emergency services did a great job

responding quickly to the situation, and they were well supported by the teams from Andium Homes and the Island's Honorary Police forces. The Parish is particularly grateful to the Constable and staff of St Saviour for providing immediate assistance in their parish hall.

This month the increasing day length reminds us that Spring is on its way, and we look forward to warmer days and the approach of Easter.

ELECTION FOR PROCUREUR DU BIEN PUBLIC AND 3 CENTENIERS

A nomination meeting for a Procureur du Bien Public and 3 Centeniers for St Helier is being held on Thursday 8th February, at 7pm in the Town Hall, with all electors welcome to attend. If there are more candidates than vacancies, public elections will be held on Wednesday 8th March 2023 between 8am and 8pm, with the Town Hall acting as the polling station.

The Procureurs du Bien Public are public trustees and maintain an oversight of Parish finances and its assets, and meet the Constable and senior managers of the Parish every month. Centeniers not only play an active part in policing their Parish, but also have an important role in the criminal justice system by holding Parish Hall Enquiries. Both roles involve a 3-year term of office.

CONSTABLE'S COMMENT

MIND HOW YOU GO!

Once upon a time, the Town Hall's offices in Seale Street were used by the Parish's Honorary Police, with the Magistrate's Court right next door. When I started as Constable our meetings would occasionally be disturbed by the shouts and curses of prisoners on remand being ushered into the court from the prison cells which are still present at the back of the Town Hall. With the construction of a new Magistrate's Court and the transfer of responsibility for Welfare, or Income Support, to the States, the Parish's Honorary Police was able to move into the Old Fire Station in Nelson Street, freeing up both the former courtroom and the

Seale Street offices. These have been rented out to a variety of organisations over the past fifteen years, including the Community Bank, the Jersey Youtheatre, and the Alliance Française, while the Old Magistrate's Court has hosted dozens of meetings, presentations, art exhibitions, concerts and theatre performances.

Our new tenants in Seale Street, Mind Jersey, are providing a drop-in centre for Islanders seeking support with their mental health, and given the pressures we are all under at the beginning of 2023, this new service is timely: whatever is giving us concern – whether it

is the global situation with war in Ukraine and other international challenges, such as climate change, or issues closer to home, like the rising cost of living, and the impact of recent events including the tragic loss of life at Haut du Mont, Pier Road, before Christmas, and the recent floods – there will be support to be found at this new base for Mind Jersey's services behind the Town Hall. I am very pleased to welcome the Mind Jersey team to the Town Hall and wish them every success as they continue to develop their services for our parishioners and all Islanders.

PARISH MATTERS



NEW CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER FOR ST HELIER

The Parish is delighted to have appointed a new Chief Executive. Having joined the Parish 2 years ago as Director of Operations, the Constable recently appointed Andrew Sugden to the role of Chief Executive Officer in December last year.

Andrew is no stranger to senior management positions. Prior to joining the Parish, he was a Director at the States of Jersey Police, where he led a number of major projects, including the digital transformation of Jersey's Police Force. Andrew has also held senior leadership roles in the Finance industry as well as Government.

When asked Andrew said "It is a dream job to work so closely with our communities and support parishioners, businesses and visitors to the Parish. The parishes are

at the heart of Island life and I have been overwhelmed by both the sense of community and support since my appointment.

About one-third of the Island's population lives in St Helier and, as well as providing the Island's main shopping experience, the Parish hosts the seat of Government, an international finance centre, and is rich in culture and history. I am supported by a good and very committed team and, together, we will look to continue to improve our services whilst also delivering value to ratepayers."

DID YOU KNOW THAT ST HELIER IS THE ONLY GAAP PARISH?

St Helier adopted GAAP (Generally Accepted Accounting Principles) thanks to the guidance of former Procureur Clive Barton and remains the only one of the Island's twelve parishes to have done this. GAAP accounting allows the Parish to recognise its assets and liabilities on the Balance Sheet and give parishioners a clearer picture of the Parish's finances.

Additionally, the Parish is able to match its income and expenditure to the financial year in which it was incurred, depreciating its assets over their lifetime and recognising changes in land and buildings values – all of which give parishioners greater transparency over St Helier's financial position.

REFLECTIONS ON THE FESTIVE PERIOD

It was a challenging end to 2022 in St Helier for many parishioners and I think that's reflected in the shopping habits we observed during December. In the build-up to Christmas, things were looking great - footfall was shaping up to be the best since pre-pandemic, the atmosphere was fantastic and everyone was really getting into the Christmas spirit, and then in one week the Island suffered 2 tragedies, the likes of which Jersey hadn't seen for a very long time. Speaking to the retailer and hospitality sectors both events have had a profound effect on people visiting our town. That being said, I'd like to take this opportunity to publicly thank those businesses and members of the public who got in touch and who offered support in whatever way they could. The outpouring of community spirit was frankly overwhelming.

It's not all doom and gloom in our town though, and St Helier continues to have new businesses opening. For example, in recent weeks, for the first time I can remember, we've had a chiropractor opening in what was traditionally retail space - a sign that our town is evolving.

JÈRRIAIS, GERAINT JENNINGS:

COMBEIN GRANDE QU'EST LA GRANDE RUE?

Nou peut dithe qué Saint Hélyi n'est pon eune grande ville, mais la Ville est à grandi auve un tas d'grands bâtisses et eune populâtion tch'est à craître. Ch'est d'espéther qu'ouille est comme les éfants Peldgé: ouille amende au craître.

La rue princîpale d'la Ville achteu ch'est la Rue d'Driéthe mais, comme san nom mouontre, ou soulait êt' eune ruelle driéthe la Grande Rue. Ch'est vrai qu'à un but la Grande Rue est eune rue d'laize, mais à l'aut' but, à la Pompe dé Bas, ouille a d'!'étraitithe. Nou-s'a dreinement proposé un grand dév'loppement dans la Grande Rue, mais ch'est d'vaie si l'sablion a tchée d'dans l'hôlouge à sablion pouor dé chu projet-là.

D'pis l'dgièx-neuvième siècl'ye, des grandes boutiques ont 'té établyies dans la Rue d'Driéthe, et avau l's années y'a bein des gens tchy'ont acaté lus grands Dînmanches. Mais au jour d'aniet, les boutiques en Ville né font pon grand sou sus d's acats qu'le monde peuvent c'mander en lingne. Les dém'nins ont à gângni gros dans tchique aut' mêtchi.

Les cafés, à chein tchi pathait, sont au grand dg'ieau achteu, auve lus grandes tâssées d'café: des grands lattés et tout chenna. Mais si y'a d's affaitthes tchi sont à la haüteu, i' n'est pon d'mêtchi qu'les boutitchièrs haütent trop. Faut rester rêvilyi pouor achîtrer les calenges du commerce. Quand y'a un grand creux, i' faut un grand cliou.

HOW BROAD IS BROAD STREET?

Saint Helier isn't a big city, but Town is getting bigger with tall buildings and a growing population. Let's hope things go like the saying: it's like Pelgué's children, it gets better as it grows up. King Street used to be the back street behind Broad Street, which is broad at one end but narrow at Charing Cross. Recently a large development has been proposed for Broad Street, but have the sands of time run out for the project? Department stores have been established in King Street since the C19th, and over the years many people have bought their Sunday best there. But shops are under great pressure from online shopping, and have to find other ways to earn. There's a high tide for cafés with their large cups of coffee: large lattes etc. But even if some businesses are on a roll, they mustn't be caught napping. One must stay awake to meet the challenges. Big problems require big solutions.

HISTORIC ST HELIER, GERAINT JENNINGS:

OUR CHANGING TOWN

Leslie Sinel, remembered for his Occupation diary, was born in Saint Helier in 1906 and worked for many years for the Evening Post. In 1953, he wrote an article about his "recollections of forty years": how life had changed in Town since he was six in 1913. Of course, 70 years on from 1953 things have changed even more, but let's look back through some extracts in Leslie Sinel's words.

"There was a large military garrison here and the Island was served both east and west by most picturesque railways. The German Band played at the street corners, and we knew summer by the Italian ice-cream man in the market or winter when the chestnut braziers came out."

"To return à nos moutons, we amused ourselves in our own way and probably as youngsters still do - fishing for cabots, pinching apples, ringing door-bells, with the ever-present knowledge that if we were caught there was always the schoolmaster's hard but affectionate boot or a three-foot length of willow... The barges in the Old Harbour were always an attractive playground, throwing stones through the "winkle hole" at the end of the Albert Pier, cowboys and indians across the Horseshoe Quarry, or a visit to the

Troglodyte Caves, all whiled away many a happy hour until eventually we were called up for the Militia, and that gave us something else to think about."

"A bag of broken biscuits for a penny, or some "broken-up" from Atkin's sweet-shop in a funnelled page of exercise book; at Smith's mineral water a drink was the reward for a returned bottle; while at Pitcher's stables we got a free drink from the water butt when we were hot."

"Across the road at the foot of the Parade was a group of shops always very busy - Mr. Amy, the baker, Mr. Howes, the watchmaker, and Mr. Ahier, the bookbinder. Next door was the place that gave us the greatest thrill, for here the Fire Brigade was stationed - or rather the engine Lord St. Helier - and on a call being received we waited to see along with two black horses to hitch on and then away, the volunteer firemen having mostly arrived by that time!"

"Le Caudey's, the bakers, came down to make way for York Chambers. That was a busy shop and the hot four-pound loaves made a fine show, with every child who had been sent to buy one hoping to be able to eat the breadcake put on the top to make up the weight!"



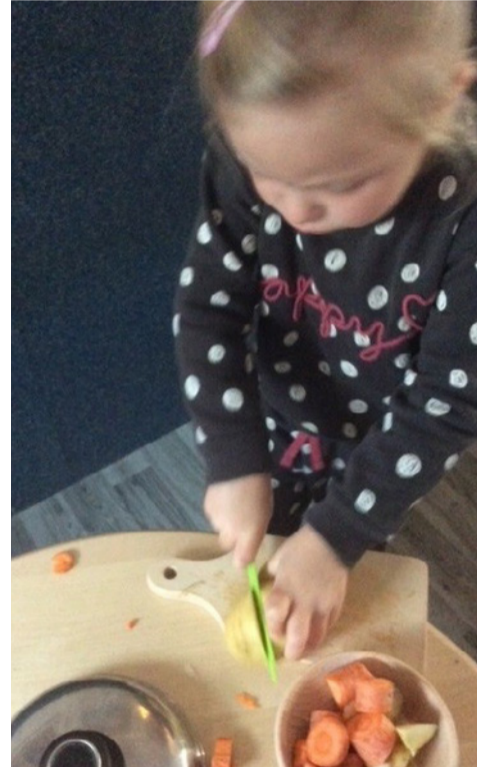
WESTMOUNT DAY NURSERY
