Municipal elections update: Roads **Committee & Roads** Inspectors

He left a vacancy within our Roads Inspectors team, for which Rosemary Boleat was also successfully elected and will now serve a three-year term.

Roads Inspectors are required to ensure that any defects to the roads, public highways, public facilities and encroachments within their Vingtaine are brought to the attention of the Parish for remedial work to be undertaken. They are requested to attend quarterly meetings and the annual September Visite du Branchage, and must participate every six years in the Visite Royale, which takes place on 7th August this year.

Mind Jersey's mental health awareness presentation

Adrian Smith, mental health trainer from Mind, attended our Municipal Services Department towards the end of last year with a presentation on mental health awareness. The presentation covered the topics of 'What is mental health?', 'What is mental illness, stress and mental health?', 'Supporting someone with a mental illness' and 'Looking after your own mental health and support available locally', the primary objectives being to increase awareness and shape an inclusive climate within the workplace, so that employees can engage with colleagues to talk openly about their mental well-being.



Mind Jersey is an independent local charity that provides support to people living with mental illness, with the aim being a society that promotes and protects good mental health for all and treats people with experience of mental illness fairly, positively and with respect. A drop-in facility, Friends of Mine, on Seale Street, is available to all, open from 10am to 4pm Monday to Friday. If you're lonely or struggling, just pop in for a chat and a cup of coffee or tea. Mind Jersey also runs various support groups, including Men's Support (7pm on the second Monday of each month at Pip's Place, Union Street), and Women's Support (10am-12pm on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month, also at Pip's Place). Telephone 07829 933929 for more information.

Mind Jersey is also always on the lookout for volunteers to support individuals experiencing mental health problems and provide them with a safe space to share experiences. If interested, please email admin@mindjersey.org or telephone 07829 933929.

Originally set up last year to help people with the cost of living crisis, the scheme has also been useful in the area of battling loneliness. The Church is split into zones depending on a visitor's needs – there's a 'work' zone with WiFi and hot desks available, a 'rest & recharge' zone where you can get hot drinks (and toast from 3pm), a prayer space, and a 'play' zone for pre-school aged children.

Do you ever wander through the Fish Market?

Maybe you just use it as a 'cut through' to the Minden Place car park ... head down past the various fish stalls and restaurants? Or perhaps, like many others, you know its delights, including Jo's Painted Pebbles, a popular and pretty little shop which is home to local artist and artisan Jo Logue.



Jo is well known in Jersey for her artistic creations and best known for her exquisite mandala dotting on scallop shells and pebbles – beautiful items which burst with colour and originality.

You may have seen her at Genuine Jersey markets, and at her shop in the Fish Market Jo also runs classes to share her passion for art, and particularly art on scallop shells! She shares her artwork on social media and is often asked the question "How do you paint your scallop shells?" So now she's written a book called, appropriately, *Art on Scallop Shells*.

Since it was first published at the back end of 2023, Jo has sold many copies online, primarily via the Great British Book Shop and Amazon, as well as in her shop, where she has produced 'starter packs' to help people who want to try an inspiring and colourful new hobby. 'I am on a lot of shell groups on social media and have a large American following, so half of my online sales have been from the USA. Locally, I have been selling the book in my shop, and the starter sets (which include the book, all the dotting tools required, paint brushes, and a selection of paints and a shell) have been very popular,' she says.

Jo is a self-taught artist who rediscovered her passion for painting in 2017 after seeing an article on Elspeth McLean's beautiful mandala-dotted river rocks. She took early retirement from a career in finance to follow her passion.

Art on Scallop Shells includes step-by-step guides to create 12 beautiful designs on scallop shells. There are details about the paints and equipment needed to reproduce some of Jo's iconic designs and fascinating information about the scallop shell in art, history and culture, as well as facts about the shells she uses, many sourced through the local company Jersey Hand Dived Scallops although lots of people know she paints scallop shells, and they often drop them off at her shop in the Fish Market!

'For me, painting shells is a calm and relaxing hobby and bright colours can lift my mood. I hope to inspire others who might want to try the art for themselves. I want them to experience the joy I feel when I paint my shells, and by using my patterns as guidelines, I hope people will find their own creativity and enjoy creating beautiful and unique pieces of art!'

The Art Of Chocolate Making

Cathy Le Feuvre meets a couple of adventurous chocolate makers

There's no doubt that Easter is a special time, especially if you adore chocolate, and chocolate eggs in particular!

However, for chocolatiers and pâtissiers Glenn Noel and Constance Claperon, chocolate isn't just for the Easter religious springtime festival. It's a year-round passion.

popcorn. And we have a range of macaroons, ten flavours, and two of them are actually plant-based so they're suitable for vegan and dairy-free consumers,' Glenn said.

Jersey-born and bred Glenn's professional culinary journey began at Highlands College and aged 19 he was crowned Channel Islands Young Chef of the Year. Work followed at the Royal Yacht Hotel, The Atlantic Hotel and in high-profile kitchens in Copenhagen and London before he was appointed head pastry chef back at The Atlantic.

A chance meeting there with the owner of Valrhona, one of the largest global chocolate companies, saw Glenn recruited as an assistant and then teacher at the prestigious Valrhona culinary school in Versailles in France, one of four academies the company operates across the world. In Versailles, Glenn met French-born pastry chef Constance, who was then working backstage on a TV show called 'Le Meilleur Pâtissier' – 'The Best Pastry Chef' (like the 'Great British Bake Off').

Constance is also a classically trained pastry chef, having worked in all aspects of pâtisserie, chocolate and bakery. It was a personal and professional match made in heaven!

Come 2019, the couple were in Dubai, with Glenn responsible for sharing the Valrhona know-how and coordinating their pastry activity across 23 countries in the Middle East, India and Africa. Constance was learning commercial skills as part of the UAE pastry department of the global company Classic Fine Foods. However, an eventual return to Jersey was always a long-term goal and in 2022 they made the transition.

Ganache Jersey opened in summer 2023 and now it's where they create, decorate and sell their spectacular confectionary, freshly handmade every day using only Valrhona chocolate and locally sourced Jersey cream, butter and eggs.

Glenn and Constance have already packed loads into life – they're both only just in their 30s – and they're excited for the future.

For Easter, there will be a special range of chocolate eggs and confectionary, including chocolate moulded figurines and Easter macaroons, and this year they plan to expand the Ganache online business and to continue to thrive with the positive adventurous spirit that inspires them.

It's time to get back to basics.

After a turbulent time in Jersey politics, I firmly believe we must steady the ship and focus on getting back to basics. That means we must prioritise essential services and tackle the most immediate challenges facing Islanders, like housing, the cost of living and getting the hospital built.

It's become clear that sometimes, as a government, we try to do far too much and end up achieving very little. The new government will be looking closely at where we are spending public money and reprioritising to make sure we are delivering the best outcomes for Islanders. We will be focusing on delivery, and not on the production of extensive reports and strategies.

We must reduce expenditure by curbing the growth in the public sector and rely less on external consultants, instead developing local talent within the civil service and redirecting monies saved to those areas where it is needed most.

I'm pleased that we have managed to bring together a Council of Ministers that is more representative of the whole States Assembly and provides an improved political balance which I believe will help to deliver in areas that benefit the community.

It is equally important that we keep the parish system at the heart of our Island community. The consistency of the parish administrations provides stability which underpins our way of life and is a cornerstone of our success and prosperity. The Connétables play an important role both in the States Assembly and in leading their parishes, are actively engaged in Island life, and play a valuable part in the overall success of the Island. A number of Connétables occupy key roles in the new government alongside parish deputies.

St Peter Connétable Richard Vibert is the new Minister for Children and Families after the role of Children and Education Minister was separated to provide more focus on these vital areas. I was pleased to see Deputy Rob Ward appointed by the States Assembly to the new role of Minister for Education and Lifelong Learning.

Connétable Andy Jehan of St John is the new Minister for Infrastructure and has also taken on political responsibility for Sport. St Helier Connétable Simon Crowcroft is an Assistant Minister in the Chief Minister's department and Assistant Minister with Connétable Jehan at Infrastructure. And St Brelade Connétable Mike Jackson is the Assistant Minister at the Environment and Planning department.

I know we will have some challenging issues to resolve in the months ahead, but one thing I hope we can do is to move on from personality politics and focus on the merits of individual proposals, and to always aim to make decisions that are in Jersey's best interests.




Mobility scooters, wheelchairs, rollators and more, available for hire from Sand Street Car Park.

- Shopmobility is a scheme to assist disabled people to go shopping, see the sites and generally get out of their homes.
- Over 350 pieces of equipment available.
- Scooters vary in size and capacity from standard for shopping and for weights up to 21 stones, large ones for weights up to 35 stones and small, but heavy, folding ones to go in a car or on an aeroplane.
- Shopmobility Jersey delivers to hotels and people's homes throughout the Island at no extra charge.
- Membership scheme available for those who are likely to want to go shopping or move around St Helier at least once in every two months for a small fee of £40 a year and just £4 for a single use, compared with £15 for a one-off, casual use.

Your View... The Penfold post boxes _{by André Ferrari}

It's often forgotten that Jersey played a key role in the creation of an essential part of the British postal system. Back in the early C19, there was no easy way to deposit the letters you wanted to post. A Post Office Surveyor's Clerk named Anthony Trollope (later famous for his novels) suggested the provision of roadside collection boxes, possibly based on ones he might have seen during his workrelated travels in Europe.

Jersey was chosen to trial 4 post boxes in 1852. A year later the trial was extended to Guernsey, which still boasts one of its exceedingly rare original post boxes whereas Jersey, alas, has none.

The trial scheme was a success, and post boxes were introduced across the UK, although the wide variety of designs caused problems despite attempts at standardisation. In 1866, a new standard pillar box was introduced, designed by J.W. Penfold, but designs would continue to evolve in the years to come.

It is the Penfold design which is now Jersey's oldest post box and which sits proudly in the Central Market, but it seems forgotten that we once had two of them. I have a vague recollection that they were originally sited on Queen's Road and near the Odeon, but others might remember the locations better. In the early 70's they were relocated to indoor positions to help protect them from deterioration, and one was placed outside the Post Office in the newly refurbished Central Market.

The other was placed in the new entertainment complex at Fort Regent.

So where is that second one now? That's anyone's guess - it seems to have vanished without trace. Did it drop into the black hole known as the Jersey Triangle, where the prison granite, St Paul's Gateway, De Gruchy's staircase and other pieces of our heritage have vanished?

Curiously enough, around the time the Penfold box was placed in the Market, another piece of communication history was removed from the same building. In the corner of the outer walls opposite Red Triangle Stores was a curious old wooden cabin, painted dark green. It was claimed to be the Island's oldest telephone box and, because of this, it was donated to the Société Jersiaise. And, unlike the post boxes which were placed indoors to protect them, this indoor feature got placed outside, standing in the courtyard behind the Société's main gate, looking increasingly decayed and neglected. And then it too vanished.

It's bad enough that we have lost so many bits of Jersey's history. But when they are deemed to be interesting enough to conserve, and then lost anyway, it starts to look like remarkable carelessness!

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Remembering Richard Rondel

Last autumn the Constable of St Helier was invited to Funchal by the Mayor, Pedro Calado, and among the official engagements was a visit to Curral das Freiras, a small town in the neighbouring parish of Câmara de Lobos.

The occasion was the unveiling of a plaque in memory of a former St Helier Deputy, Richard Rondel, by two of his sons, James and Jack. As well as being a Parish Deputy between 2011 and 2018, Richard was a farmer who had developed strong links with this particular region of Madeira from which dozens of his employees originated, and, during the visit, he met several people who had fond memories of their former employer.

Before his untimely death at the age of 54, Richard did a great deal to support the local Madeiran and Portuguese community and to celebrate the ways in which the lives of St Helier parishioners and all Islanders are enriched by Portuguese culture and heritage. He also was instrumental in the development of the Fête de St Hélier, St Helier's annual street party, and enjoyed taking part in its opening parade, proudly carrying the St Helier flag behind the Band of the Island of Jersey and the brightly dressed street performers.









Last year the Parish unveiled a memorial bench for Richard in Broad Street near the Pierre Le Sueur obelisk and fountains, from where the parade starts. Le Sueur, a former Constable of St Helier, also died prematurely and his inscription tells us that he devoted himself to his people, an accolade which is also true of Richard. He continues to be missed, in both of the islands he supported with enthusiasm, commitment and cheerfulness.

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A battle lost: **St Helier's arsenal goes up in flames** yıstora navezete

For nearly 70 years the Town Arsenal stood in St James Street, behind what today is the Freedom Centre in the old Odeon Cinema. But as historian Ian Ronayne recalls, one memorable night in 1900 saw this centre of Parish military life lost – for the want of enough water.

A scene of ruinous desolation greeted curious visitors to St James Street on the morning of 24 January 1900. The Town Arsenal, for years a busy hive of military activity, had been reduced to a pitifully blackened and still smoking wreck. Fire – that most feared of enemies in Victorian St Helier – had claimed yet another victim.

The arsenal building was mostly gutted. Only the northern gun shed had somehow escaped the inferno, its two cannons appearing remarkably unblemished by flames or falling debris. The same was not true for the southern shed – its two guns lay within a heap of debris, their barrels turned rusty red by the heat and water used to fight the fire.

Dirty puddles filling the arsenal's yard further underlined forlorn efforts to battle the previous evening's blaze. As did untidy heaps of rescued uniforms and other materials which appeared like ragged islands rising from surrounding waters.

It was a most gloomy outcome for this important and once highly regarded Parish asset.

St Helier's Arsenal

The Town Arsenal was erected in 1835 as tensions rose once more between Britain and France. Jersey's government came under pressure to build several central arsenals for housing cannons and other equipment used by the Island's Militia regiments. While the States argued over who should foot the bill, St Helier had gone ahead and constructed its own arsenal on land at the northern end of St James Street.

A contemporary report described the arsenal as 'substantial and spacious, and highly creditable to the local authorities'. The only complaint tilted at the Constable of St Helier's decision to let the building 'from time-to-time for purposes entirely foreign to the purpose for which it was built'. Private events had no place in a military facility.

The granite-fronted arsenal building possessed three storeys. There were two gun sheds on the ground floor, separated by a central regimental orderly room. A drill hall for training new recruits filled most of the first floor. Within the top floor's pitched roof was a store for weapons, uniforms and accoutrements.

A large walled drill yard stood in front. There was a coal store and adjacent house for the appointed arsenal storekeeper, which also doubled as an officers' mess.

Fire breaks out

It was a daughter of Quarter Master Sergeant Pullen, then the arsenal's storekeeper, who first detected the impending conflagration. Returning from collecting coal early in the evening of 23 January, she mentioned to her mother that a light was visible glowing within the arsenal building.

Mrs Pullen went to investigate - no one should be inside at that time. In the yard, she discovered several other curious passersby drawn to the arsenal after noticing thick smoke issuing from the southern gable window. Now alarmed, Mrs Pullen hurriedly unlocked the door and the group entered, climbing the stairs to reach the second floor. To their horror, a strong fire had already taken hold there. With no means to tackle the blaze, they hastily retreated outside, grasping whatever stores could be carried.

Flames had broken through the roof by then and were shooting into the evening sky, alerting more people to the unfolding calamity. Someone telephoned the police and sent for fire engines, one of which soon arrived. Its crew swiftly set up the pump, ran out hoses and connected the apparatus to a water hydrant located on the corner of Nelson Street and David Place.

Help seemed at hand – perhaps the arsenal could be saved. But what was wrong with the water?

For the want of water

Despite furious pumping by willing volunteers, the fire crew had only a weak flow of water to hose the now flaming building. There seemed to be a lack of pressure. A second fire engine arrived, brought by the army garrison from Fort Regent. Attaching this to a hydrant in St James Street they advanced on the flames. Yet once again the pressure proved too weak - the fire was in charge and roaring rapidly out of control.

With appliances floundering, some among the assembled crowd, which included Bailiff William Venables and Constable Philippe Baudains, turned to old-fashioned methods. A human bucket chain carried water from a pump in St James Street through the arsenal gates for throwing onto the flames. The results were understandably negligible, however valiant the efforts.

Other brave souls set about rescuing what could be saved from the blazing building. Despite red-hot tiles crashing into the yard from its burning roof and ignoring the bangs of exploding munitions, they darted in and out to rescue record books, uniforms and accoutrements.

Eventually, even these forlorn efforts came to an end and there was nothing left but to watch flames consume the building. It was a magnificent spectacle at least, someone remarked, though not as grand as when fire destroyed the Opera House in the previous year.

Militia on parade at the Town Arsenal in St James Street towards the end of the 19th century – the building dated to 1835

By 9:30 the fire was burning itself out and the audience beginning to disperse. A third, lately arrived, fire engine had managed to find a hydrant in Common Lane with enough pressure to save parts of the north side of the building. But otherwise, the arsenal was mostly gutted - the roof gone, floors collapsed, and doors burnt through. There was nothing more to be done other than ask the question: how did it come to this?

Blame and answers

There was a strong suspicion the fire had started on the arsenal's top floor, where an open fireplace stood for drying damp uniforms. Perhaps a rogue spark had escaped to smoulder among the rafters before blazing into life on that fateful evening. But once detected, surely there had been a chance to extinguish or at least diminish the flames? The finger of blame pointed towards an inadequate water supply.

For his part, Mr Foster Barham, manager of the Jersey New Waterworks Company, deflected the accusations on to other factors. The pressure was sufficient, Mr Barham insisted, the problem lay with attempts to connect the fire engines to the hydrants, with techniques employed amateurish and equipment used obsolete, or as old as Noah's Ark, he flourished.

Whatever the underlying cause – whether lack of water pressure or lack of firefighting capability – there was general acceptance change was needed. No fewer than 40 blazes had ravaged town in the last two years. It was high time the authorities took steps towards establishing an effectual fire brigade for St Helier.

The Parish authorities listened. In 1901, St Helier formed a fire brigade, operated by trained volunteers who used horse-drawn fire engines stored at the Town Hall. In 1923, the brigade moved to a new building – ironically at the former Town Arsenal in St James Street.

As for the arsenal itself, well it had moved to a new building at Rouge Bouillon. Before that, however, had come considerable arguments over who should pay for its construction. But that's a battle for another story.

When Cathy Le Feuvre was asked to interview Charlie, at Le Marquand Brothers Pet's Paradise opposite People's Park, she was excited to chat to the legendary Jersey bird. The conversation went 'something' like this ...

Cathy: Hello Charlie! How long have you been at Pet's Paradise?

Charlie: Around 40 years, I think. I can't really remember because I'm quite old now. Alice (Cottington) – who's second in command here at Pet's Paradise – reckons I'm in my late 70s, or even my early 80s.

Some people of a certain age MAY remember me from Fort Regent. I was already aged about 30 when I was rescued and moved here to my new home. I was in an aviary there at Fort Regent, with lots of other birds.

Cathy: Have you always lived in a cage?

Charlie: I can't remember anything else. I think I was born 'in captivity', as they say, but my ancestors were probably born wild.

Did you know, I'm a 'Goffin's Cockatoo'? Our family comes originally from some small islands in Indonesia, way on the other side of the world.

Alice and her friends are very kind and I do get out and about, when the shop is closed. Now, when I do emerge, I fly a little but mostly I like to be cuddled. I'm a 'lap bird'!

They look after me very well. I have special branches which I use to look after my beak and claws for myself, but the staff give me little showers when I'm moulting, and I like to splash around in my water bowl to get clean. And I like my bell. And my treats!

Cathy: What are your favourites?

Charlie: Well, my main food is a mix of seeds, dried chillies, bits of dried corn and monkey nuts. Alice says you can buy it here and it's made especially for birds like me.

I love almonds and sometimes I also get treated to something called a 'Millet Spray', a sort of sprig loaded with seeds.

Cathy: Anything you can't eat?

Charlie: Avocado! It's very toxic for birds like me. Deadly!

Cathy: I know you get lots of visitors, including children. Do you like kids?

Charlie: Mostly I do. Sometimes they cry when I squawk! But I love it when they jump up and down in front of me. I also love to dance which makes everyone smile.

By the way, I hate being ignored! If Alice and the others are talking to someone else, I'll let them know I'm unhappy and need attention. I do that by squawking! Very loudly!

Alice says I'm a mixture of a teenager needing attention and a grumpy old man! That about sums me up. I have my moods – I'm 'quirky'!

Cathy: But you're always happy to meet people who come into the shop?

Charlie: Yes ... unless there's a blanket over my cage. That means I'm sleeping, which, to be honest, I do quite of lot of these days.

As I said, I AM quite old, and I need my rest!

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Accessibility with **Shopmobility**

7th June National Shopmobility Day Exhibition in Library

Shopmobility is a scheme to assist disabled people to go shopping, see the sights and generally get out of their homes. There are over 100 centres throughout the British Isles. Each is independent and some are charities, some are run by retail outlets and some are run by local authorities.

In Jersey the Centre is a charity, (number 70), and based in the lower ground floor of the Sand Street car park.

Shopmobility was opened on Good Friday 2005 to help shoppers but very quickly visitors to the Island asked about having scooters or wheelchairs available at hotels for the length of their holiday. This resulted in a huge increase from the original ten mobility scooters and power chairs and six manual wheelchairs to 120 scooters, 110 wheelchairs and six power chairs. Tri- and quad-walkers, Zimmer frames, toilet seats with frames and shower stools are also held and used by both temporary and permanently disabled people. In total there are over 350 pieces of equipment available.



The scooters vary in size and capacity from standard for shopping for those weighing up to 21 stones, large ones for weights up to 35 stones, and small, but heavy, folding ones to go in a car or on an aeroplane. The insurance covers Europe.

Shopmobility Jersey delivers to hotels and people's homes throughout the Island at no extra charge.



There is a membership scheme for those who are likely to want to go shopping or around St Helier at least once in every two months: the cost is $\pounds40$ pa and just $\pounds4$ for each individual use compared with $\pounds15$ for casual users.

The Government of Jersey provides the premises at no cost and 12 parking spaces, some of which are released for blue badge holders for use in the winter months when demand is lower. The 3-hour time limit in the Sand Street car park does not apply to Shopmobility users.

Shopmobility Jersey is a member of ShopMobility UK, which organisation gives advice to both centres, the public and Government. It also helps with advice to proposed centres although does not have funds to donate or loan.

10am to 4.30pm April to October10am to 2.30pm November to MarchMonday to Saturday excluding Bank and Public Holidays.

In addition to the above, Shopmobility supplies a scooter to disabled people on Income Support if recommended by a doctor, OT or a health professional from Health and Community Services. The cost is just £35 per calendar month, which payment covers insurance, batteries and maintenance.

The scooters are provided from general funds.

A way of change: looking back at La Colomberie's past

The streetscape of one significant town road has changed many times over the years. Historian Ian Ronayne explores its history and wonders about its future.

Being in or even near La Colomberie in the early hours of 6 January 1781 may have been a dangerous move. After secretly landing at La Rocque in the early hours of that day, French troops led by Baron de Rullecourt were stealthily passing this way on route to the town marketplace (today's Royal Square).

They were in a violent mood. Several curious residents of the area received stab or slash wounds – one was even done to death.

Shortly after, the invaders hauled the Island's Lieutenant Governor from his house – which may have been the property that gave La Colomberie its name.

What's in a name?

Major Moses Corbet lived in La Motte Manor, an ancient pile on the corner of St James Street and Grosvenor Street that included a dovecote. There is one theory that from this structure La Colomberie gained its name – 'colombier' being French for dovecote. However, more earthy scholars point to a less whimsical alternative. The street probably took its name from the Coulomp family, known to have lived in the area.

Whatever its origins, La Colomberie of 1781 was a far different thoroughfare from that of today. St Helier was then a very modest affair, centred on the Town Church and marketplace, with only a few surrounding streets lined with properties. La Colomberie mostly passed through fields and orchards, with only the Snow Hill end occupied. It was still the principal way into town from the southeast nonetheless – hence its use by the French that historic morning – and so an important road.

Urban spread

The century following the Battle of Jersey saw St Helier expanding to fill much of the land surrounding Mont de la Ville, which Fort Regent stands upon. Development crept along La Colomberie, lining it with a mixture of homes, shops and businesses.

Among the grandest properties was Colomberie House, once standing opposite Grenville Street. Its controversial late 1990s demolition to make way for offices led not only to protests but also reflection on how Jersey should value its historic buildings.

Unwelcome and welcome visitors

By the early 20th century, hotels began appearing along La Colomberie as Jersey's tourism industry developed. The Second World War understandably halted this trend, with the Germans requisitioning the nearby Metropole Hotel for their occupation headquarters.

Post-war, tourism boomed and La Colomberie with it. There were not only major hotels present, such as The Ritz and The Norfolk, the road also led to and from locations popular with holidaymakers, including Howard Davis Park and Havre des Pas. Cafés, restaurants, hire car offices, coach depot and tourist shops stretched along bustling pavements. Party Island . . . plenty of business!

As Jersey's tourism industry declined in the late 20th century, however, so too did the area's vibrancy. Changes to traffic flow and pedestrianisation were meant to help - but did little more than divide this once popular thoroughfare into sections, with the most easterly bit largely separated from town and usually clogged with traffic and parked cars.

What does the future hold for La Colomberie? Will it ever regain its historic and cultural status as a preeminent town street? Not in the shortterm would be a safe bet. But St Helier never stands still – it seems. Like the French invaders of yesteryear, a cunning plan to use La Colomberie may appear and surprise us all.

Celebrating La Colomberie

Small independent boutiques and retailers, hairdressers and salons, cafés and restaurants ... were you aware that all this and more can be found just a short walk from Snow Hill in La Colomberie? In this issue of Town Crier, Cathy Le Feuvre discovers that there's a thriving and diverse retail and business community there that many shoppers have yet to discover, or rediscover.

There's no doubt that for many people, Snow Hill is about as far as they may venture when shopping in St Helier, thinking they've reached the 'Top of Town'. But they're wrong!

The shopping experience doesn't end at Snow Hill. Take just a few steps more into the thoroughfare which stretches up towards and past Green Street and further on towards Howard Davis Park, and you'll find a range of independent retailers – some of them old and established Jersey businesses – offering something a little different to what you might find in the town centre and in the larger department stores.

You might be one of those who have popped up La Colomberie to buy something fun for a party at the Fancy Dress Box, but have you wandered further? Past the colourful mural at the Grenville Street junction, on to Colomberie Court where you'll find Dandy Coffee Shop and other eateries, up to the parade of shops nearer to Howard Davis Park? Just a five-minute stroll from Snow Hill, there you'll find Hook Line and Sinker on the corner of Green Street and further up, a quirky mix of shops including the Music Scene Record Shop, Newton and Newton (registered gun retailers) and Bella Fiori florist's shop.

Whether you're needing a garment altered – there's a choice in La Colomberie at Ana Lina Alterations, or Needle and Thimble Alterations – or wanting to stock up on sewing and crafty supplies at Rachel's Textiles, it's all there.

In the past La Colomberie was more vibrant, especially when there were more finance workers and businesses operating in the area. Since the closure of hotels at the top of the road near the park, and the creation of the finance district down at the Waterfront, passing trade has dropped significantly. But many people do still walk through La Colomberie, en route into town for work or on their way home, and they can't fail to miss some great restaurants, cafés and patisseries as well as a host of salons, hairdressers, a gym, convenience stores, and much more along the way.

In conversation with some of the business owners in the area, I discovered that they would like more investment in the area to help people understand how much La Colomberie has to offer and to encourage people to linger a little longer rather than just passing through. One idea is more greenery in the street, and flowered-filled planters to brighten the day of commuters and shoppers!

La Colomberie is a great community and those who have invested so much time and effort into their businesses there







would love people to take those few extra steps past Snow Hill, following the signs to the Howard Davis Park, to spend time enjoying what it has to offer.

An Aladdin's Cave Of Creativity

'You're my magnet into Colomberie!'

So said one customer when I was visiting Rachel Concannon at her quirky, colourful store, packed full of everything you'll need for sewing and other crafts – Rachel's Textiles, almost at the far end of La



Colomberie, near the Howard Davis Park.

Here you'll find fabrics, haberdashery and so much more. Rachel is also the premier dealer of Janome sewing machines in Jersey.

'I sell and will service Janome sewing machines, overlockers and embroideryonly machines, and I'm here to help if you're not sure about setting up or using your machine,' she says.

As a member of Genuine Jersey, Rachel also creates other products bearing that marque including cards and other beautifully handmade items like soft 3D sculptures – cats (lots of cats!), chickens, rabbits, and even a soft sculptured sewing machine!

Rachel's reputation goes before her. She was well known as a textiles and home economics teacher, latterly as the Head of Textiles at Jersey College for Girls. But in June 2014 she opened her shop in La Colomberie and created what has become her 'happy place'.

'It's the most perfect place, home from home, I love coming to work. It's hard work because I'm my own boss, but I love the colour, I love the joy of the fabrics, all the haberdashery, the buttons, the threads ... I love threads!'

Rachel really enjoyed sewing as she grew up and after a lifetime of passing on her passion and knowledge to students, she is still 'teaching', in a way. Since the Covid pandemic, many more people have taken up crafting and sewing and Rachel is on hand to advise.

'People come in and look around and so many say it's like an Aladdin's Cave. They see something and it sparks an idea, or the fabrics will take them somewhere where they didn't expect to go. I want people to be creative. The joy that it gives, the therapy of sitting at a sewing machine, or hand stitching ... you just lose yourself in the process and it is glorious, it's so rewarding.'

In the decade since Rachel's Textiles opened in La Colomberie, she has seen changes. Hotels have closed which means fewer holidaymakers dropping in, and parking restrictions in town have proved challenging. In response, Rachel has changed her opening hours and now opens on Sunday mornings when people can park in town more easily and stroll up to see her. That's working well, especially for her loyal customers.

But she and the other small independent shop owners at the top end of La Colomberie would love more people to drop by and say 'hello'.

'Please come and find us and explore. There are lots of great shops up here. It's really worth the walk!'

Despite a drop in footfall over recent years, Katherine is confident that if shoppers discover the friendliness and diversity of the independent retailers in Colomberie, they'll come back time and again.

'A lot of people know we're here and come to visit. We also have lovely clothes shops near us, and hairdressers, so people come up here and find us. We've seen more little boutiques, more hairdressers and salons turn up, and obviously there are some quite wellestablished businesses up here like Affinity and Ellis. It's a great community!'

Eating Out (Or In) In La Colomberie

You don't have to go far in St Helier to find a coffee shop, café or restaurant, and in La Colomberie there's plenty to choose from. Talking of scrumptious morsels, one of the latest additions to La Colomberie is the very tasty Flour – an exquisite independent bakery and patisserie where you can enjoy artisan cakes and bakes, either on the premises as part of a great sit-down menu, or to take away for a special event. 





Constable's Comment: Inside the tent

The Constable of St Helier explains why he has joined the Council of Ministers

When the Constable of St Helier joined the Council of Ministers as Assistant Chief Minister at the end of last year he could have had no idea that it would only be for a matter of weeks.

The previous Chief Minister was replaced by Deputy Lyndon Farnham at the end of January and a new Council of Ministers approved, meaning that the Constable's first executive role in the Government of Jersey looked like being as brief as the term of office of a certain UK Prime Minister! However, the Constable has been invited by the new Chief Minister to continue in the role, and Mr Crowcroft is optimistic that this will be in the best interests of St Helier parishioners.

'I have sought to represent my Parish for many years from the back benches of the States Assembly,' the Constable says. 'And while there have been some successes such as persuading the States at long last to pay rates on publicly owned property, and protecting our open spaces like People's Park from development, it has been difficult to convince

Ministers that the quality of life of St Helier residents really matters when Government decisions are being made.'

'I have lost count of the number of Propositions (Private Members Bills for debate by the States Assembly) which have been opposed by successive administrations, while some of those which I have won have simply been ignored, such as the decision to set up a steering group to manage the Lido at Havre des Pas, and several broken promises in respect of advancing safe routes for walking and cycling in St Helier.'

The Constable hopes that as Assistant Chief Minister with responsibility for Urban Renewal, as well as being Assistant Minister for both Infrastructure and Economic Development, he will be able to move swiftly forward to make practical improvements in Town access as this is a critical part of urban regeneration. 'I would like to work with the relevant officers to bring forward the long overdue strategies for walking, cycling and parking for debate by the States before the summer recess,' he says, 'and to press on thereafter with the provision of safe, convenient walking routes in/out and around the Town and, where possible, segregated cycling routes.' Mr Crowcroft wants the parking strategy to pay particular attention to the needs of mobility-impaired drivers, and address the current abuse of their on-street parking bays as well as difficulties experienced by drivers of delivery and service vehicles, and to improve cycle parking. 'I would also like to oversee some improvements to the Town Link bus service,' he adds.

The urban renewal brief is not restricted to St Helier, says the Constable, who pledges to ask the Constables for their input about regeneration needs in all parishes. However, he plans to concentrate initially on 'Town' as described in the Bridging Island Plan with a particular emphasis on the urban area within the Ring Road, Havre des Pas and First Tower.

As far as open space in town goes, the Constable hopes that the new Council of Ministers will be aware of his manifesto commitment to doubling the size of the Millennium Town Park as envisaged by Andium Homes, a concept which was used to secure planning permission for an increased loading of some of the housing developments in the north of Town. He believes that if an alternative site can be found for the proposed and agreed new primary school, the expansion of the town park in the most densely populated part of Town would be of incalculable benefit in future.




